Village President Update

I would like to welcome Tim Barber and Stacy Grunwald to the Village of Cleveland. Tim, who resides in the Plymouth area, began his full-time employment with the Cleveland Police Department in September. Stacy, who resides in the rural Cleveland area, was appointed to the position of Village Clerk/Treasurer in October. Both of these employees bring their expertise to our community and have become valuable assets to our residents.

The village board has just completed the 2002 budget. Many hours were spent trying to put together a budget that our residents and employees can live with. It is great to provide services to our community, but everything comes at a cost. Just for an example, we needed to budget \$18,000 for electricity for our street lighting. This is not a luxury or optional expense, it is a necessity. Of course, the board is concerned about rising property taxes, but many costs are fixed, such as the street lighting. When you review your property tax bill, please remember the Village of Cleveland receives only a portion of your taxes. The majority is for the Sheboygan School District, with Manitowoc County, the State of Wisconsin and Lakeshore Technical College also receiving a portion.

As you have noticed, we have some apartment buildings being constructed. On the corner of Linden Street and Madison Avenue, Mastercraft Builders is completing one building, with another proposed for next year. To the north of the Meadowbrook Subdivision, Kleinert Inc. is constructing an eight unit apartment building to be completed in spring of 2002. We welcome this development to our community.

I would like to remind our residents that several years ago, Cleveland adopted a garbage ordinance. It states, "all receptacles and containers for refuse and rubbish and all bundles of rubbish shall be placed near the curb of the property in an accessible location for the garbage collector or at properly designated places not earlier than twenty-four (24) hours before the regular collection time. All receptacles and containers for refuse and garbage disposal shall be removed from the curbside collection point within twentyfour (24) hours after the regular collection time." When I see garbage at the curbside on Saturday or early Sunday morning, what kind of message do we send to the people who visit our community? Why should your neighbors and our residents have to see that for days? And why should it be another obstacle for our snow plows to contend with? Please respect

our community and keep it looking appealing for our visitors and neighbors.

As we approach the holiday season and give thanks for all our blessings, please remember the people who serve your community. Take a moment to thank Steve, Mike, Bill and



John for providing us with safe water to drink and roads that are in good condition. Thank Brian, Tim and Rhonda for keeping our community safe. Thank Stacy and Beth for managing the daily affairs of our community. Thank the trustees, Dave, Lorraine, Chris, Kathy, Gretchen and Mike for all the hours they have given to conduct the business of this community. These people are all very important to me and to our community. Until you get involved, you have no idea what they all do!

Police Department

On September 10, 2001, Officer Timothy Barber joined the police department. Officer Barber graduated from Lakeshore Technical College and is a native of Plymouth. Officer Barber had previously worked for Elkhart Lake Police Department. Officer Barber is married and has two sons.

Winter Parking Ban

Effective December 1, 2001 through March 31, 2002 from 1 a.m. to 6 a.m. no vehicles may be parked on any village street on the dates and times listed above. Permission may be granted by the police department to leave a vehicle parked on the street overnight for an emergency only.

New Parking Ordinance/Resolution

At the August board meeting, the village board passed a resolution allowing one hour parking in the 1000 block of W. Grant Avenue, Monday through Friday, between 8 a.m. and 8 p.m.

Automatic External defibrillators (AEDs)

A group called "Save a Heart" donated AEDs to every law

enforcement agency in the county. In all, 54 units were donated so that every Manitowoc County emergency vehicle is equipped with the life saving devices.

AEDs are machines that are capable of determining if an abnormal heart rhythm is in need of an electric shock and then it delivers the shock if needed. They are lightweight, compact, easy to use, and affordable, averaging approximately \$2,500 each.

"Save a Heart" organized about a year has raised a total of \$146,000. "Save a Heart" had a lot of help too, holding fundraisers by individuals, organizations, companies, and foundations. The West Foundation gave \$50,000 to the cause. In addition, 10 percent of Heart-A-Rama's net proceeds were used for AED purchases.

The machines will not allow a victim to be shocked if they are not in ventricular fibrillation. The machines "talk" the rescue worker through the necessary steps to use the AED on a victim, such as, "Do not Shock" "Check Pulse," or "Shock Now."

The machines high-speed microprocessors can diagnose and administer appropriate life saving shocks.

Training includes interactive practice scenarios and reflective videos.

Typically, the police are the first to arrive at emergency scenes and until recently only fire rescue vehicles were equipped with AEDs.

Sudden cardiac arrest occurs when the heart stops beating due to a malfunction in its electrical system. It is the leading cause of death in the U.S., claiming 350,000 lives each year. Cancer claims about 280,000 lives and AIDS claims 130,000 lives, according to statistics from the American Red Cross.

Tomorrow about 1,000 people nationwide will suffer from a sudden cardiac arrest and only 50 will survive.

The tragedy is that most of the deaths are unnecessary.

Defibrillation is the only treatment for sudden cardiac arrest that promises significant rates of success. Defibrillation can save a patient's life in the majority of cases, if administered early enough.

It works most effectively, however, when administered in the first 5 to 10 minutes after an arrest. Therefore, every minute after cardiac arrest becomes vital.

The chance of survival diminishes 10 percent per minute without defibrillation. The police department is equipped with two AEDs, one for each squad car. Each officer has received the training for using the AEDs.

Crime Stoppers Reward

The Cleveland Police Department is offering up to a \$750 cash reward through the Crime Stoppers Program for information leading to the arrest of the person or persons responsible for the theft of \$122 worth of soda and beer, taken from the concession stand at the Vet's Memorial Park, on Dairyland Drive, in the Village of Cleveland.

The theft would have occurred sometime between 09-01-01 and 09-03-01, during the hours of 4:30 and 2:30 p.m.

Callers with information leading to the arrest of the person or persons responsible for this theft can become eligible to receive up to \$75 cash reward by calling Crime Stoppers at 920-683-4466. Callers may remain anonymous if they choose.

The Cleveland Police Department joins every law enforcement agency in Wisconsin to launch massive seat belt crackdown to save lives.

The Cleveland Police Department joined more than 10,000 law enforcement agencies nationwide, from November 19, 2001 through November 25, 2001 to crack down on drivers who fail to buckle up or buckle up children. During the Operation ABC Mobilization, America Buckles Up Children, Officers will conduct saturation patrols to stop and ticket drivers who violate seat belt and child passenger safety laws.

The mobilization has grown ten-fold since it began in 1997. The Cleveland Police Department participates because officers know that writing tickets saves lives and prevents the tragedies that result when adults and children ride unbuckled. Traffic crashes killed 30 children and 559 adults in Wisconsin in 1999, and remain the No. 1 killer of kids.

LTC

From the sounds of the voices in the halls, school at Lakeshore Technical College (LTC) is in full swing once again. After the quiet summer, we always look forward to the fall semester. The tragic events of September 11 have had a significant impact on the campus climate, but we continue to move forward. LTC, in cooperation with the Student Government Association, was able to raise over \$1,200 for the relief effort.

This past summer, the Village of Cleveland received word from former Cleveland village resident Richard Wagner that he and his wife, Audelia, have decided to set up an educational assistance fund for the residents of Cleveland. The Wagners have established a \$100,000 endowment fund to be used for this purpose. The monies, which go through the LTC Foundation, are awarded on an annual basis to deserving Cleveland students currently pursuing additional education at any institution. The endowment fund allows for \$10,000 annually to be awarded.

LTC has been enjoying a significant increase in enrollments for the 2001-2002 academic year. Currently, the enrollments are up 11 percent over last year. This is due to our efforts in enrollment management as well as the changing economy. The displaced workers in the area have come to us for training and re-training. In addition, the college has put forth a significant effort to improve our enrollment management processes and systems, for example: lead generation, recruitment, communication and retention activities.

Additionally, the LTC Board has approved the expenses of the Child Care Service program from a one-year to a two-year associate degree program. This will allow LTC students who earn an associate degree in Child Care Services the option to complete a four-year degree program with UW-Milwaukee and UW-Parkside.

January marks the beginning of the first semester of our two-year Associate Degree CIS Web Development and Design program. This innovative program is the only one in the state. As technology moves forward into the twenty first century, LTC is pleased to continually re-assess the needs of the Lakeshore district. This new program is just another example of being a premier provider of technical education.

In January, LTC is looking forward to hosting the district boards association quarterly meeting. The board members from the 16 technical colleges around the state meet four times a year. While The American Club is the host site for this event, this will be a great chance to showcase the LTC Cleveland campus. I would like to extend the invitation to all of you to come and visit our campus-feel free to stop in anytime and see the great technology and learning experiences going on at Lakeshore Technical College!

The tour visited four sites: chronicling farming in the 1850's at the Lutze Housebarn; a traditional Wisconsin family farm at the Michael Kolb Farm; a large scale high tech farm at the Soaring Eagle with Jim Fitzgerald and alternative farming methods, farming in the future and the world at the Saxon Homestead with Jerry Heimerl.


A comparative study of "Agriculture in Africa and Cuban" was presented by Dr. Richard Weigand also in October.


keep you warm and hot chocolate and s'mores are all part of the fun. It is a traditional family event and the entire community is invited.




