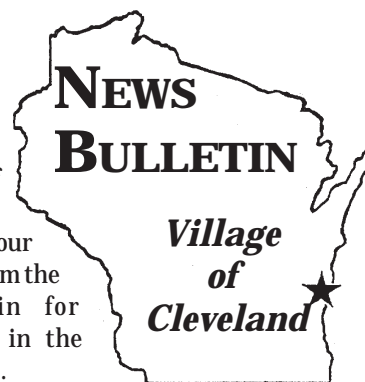
Clerk - Treasurer Update:

The Village of Cleveland has received their School Levy Tax Credit from the State of Wisconsin in the amount of \$105,367.75 and also their July Shared Revenue from the State of Wisconsin in the amount of \$39,072.48.

In April, the clerk - treasurer completed the application for the Recycling Grant, and in May was notified that the village would be receiving their 2001 Recycling Grant from the State

Police Department:

Vest Grant

In May, 2001, the police department was awarded \$257.19 from the United States Department of Justice for the purchase of body armor. A body armor vest "life expectancy is five years." The average cost of a vest is between \$500-\$700 per vest.

School Opens

Remember to drive safely in school zones. The first day of class for the Cleveland Elementary School was September 4, 2001. The speed limit in a school zone is **15 m.p.h. only when children are present**. When children are not present the speed limit is 25 m.p.h. The State Statute reads "15 m.p.h. when passing a schoolhouse at those times when children are going to or from school or are playing within the sidewalk area at or about the school."

Parking Violation

In the past few months, the police department has received several complaints of vehicles being parked on village streets for more than 72 hours without being moved. The ordinance states, "no vehicle can be parked in the same place for more than 72 hours on all village streets."

MADD Grant

In April, the police department was awarded \$300 from MADD (Mothers Against Drunk Drivers). The grant money was to be used to purchase a PAS (Passive Alcohol Sensor) flashlight. These flashlights have a sensor inside the flashlight, which will detect alcohol, enabling the officer to determine whether further sobriety testing of the driver is required. The PAS flashlights are strictly used as a tool.

Crime Stoppers

Vandalism

The Cleveland Police Department is offering up to a \$100 cash reward through the Crime Stoppers Program for information leading to the arrest of the person or persons responsible for the vandalism done to the men's bathroom, in Vet's Memorial Park.

The damage would have occurred at approximately 5:55 p.m., on June 15, 2001. The estimated damage done was \$245. Also, on the evening of July 1, 2001, vandalism was done to the men's bathroom.

Theft

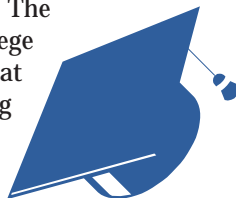
The Cleveland Police Department is offering up to a \$75 cash reward through the Crime Stoppers Program for information leading to the arrest of the person or persons responsible for the theft of \$150, taken from the cash drawer of the Country Horizons Co-op Store, in the Village of Cleveland.

The theft would have occurred at approximately 1:15 p. m., on July 18, 2001. The cash consisted of (4) \$20 bills and (7) \$10 dollar bills.

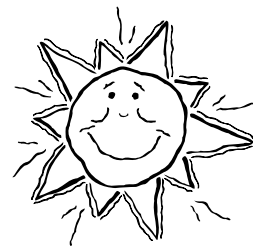
I am pleased to say that for the fifth year in a row, LTC was able to increase its full time equivalent (FTE) enrollment to 1956 students, up from 1948 students the year before. This is the fifth consecutive year of enrollment growth, and we are happy to be serving more and more members of the Lakeshore community, the state of Wisconsin, and even the world with our services!

The Tech Adventure Camp, which runs from August 13-16 from 8:30 a.m.-noon, is certainly a great addition to the campus. The program, sponsored by the Lakeshore Area Tech Prep Consortium in conjunction with LTC, is for students entering 8th or 9th grade who have an interest in career discovery. The camp offers hands on opportunities for students in any of the areas that LTC offers.

A highlight from the summer is that LTC graduated our first group of Medication Assistant students. Eight students made up the first twelve-week section of the course, with another section beginning in September. The Medication Assistant program was created at LTC to help address the skilled worker shortage going on in the Lakeshore area, particularly in health care. The program is available to Certified Nursing Assistants (CNAs) who have completed 2000 hours of work in that field. The Medication Assistant program is twelve weeks, after which the students are certified to pass medications to patients.

Now fall is just around the corner. With that comes new staff members, new students, and new programs. But before you get out your long sleeves and put away your bathing suits, enjoy these last days of summer, and we will see you again in the fall!
