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### **Village President Update**

There has been a lot of information published about the shared revenue cuts to municipalities from the State of Wisconsin. Cleveland could lose about \$54,000 of the \$262,000 we were scheduled to receive in this calendar year. The trustees and department managers put a lot of time and work into the village budget, we all struggled to get the most out of the tax dollars available to us. Now, to consider additional cuts becomes a very difficult process, keeping in mind the degree of services our residents expect and our fixed operational costs we have no control over. I will continue to follow the Budget Repair Bill, as it goes through the various hearings and committees. I anticipate this to be front page news for several weeks.

I would like to encourage the residents to get involved and attend village meetings, especially the monthly board meetings. When an issue effects your neighborhood, a few people come to let us know their opinions. People maybe attend one or two meetings until their issue is voted on, but they forget that we deal with issues that effect this community every month. I would like to hear how people feel about issues that effect Cleveland as a whole, not just when something may happen in your back yard. It is also good to attend the meetings to get the facts. Please remember that the rumors you hear are not always fact, but comments taken out of context and given a new meaning.

As I look back over the last year since you elected me your village president, it has been a busy and exciting time for me. I have had the opportunity to learn about government and the issues that effect it. I have also enjoyed the various meetings when I get to represent your community. I am very fortunate to have a board of trustees that is dedicated to doing what is best for Cleveland and our residents. And finally, I am very proud of our village employees. They are talented, dedicated, and knowledgeable people, who handle the challenges of this community on a daily basis. Together with the board of trustees and village employees, I look forward to the second year of my term as your village president.

## **Public Works**

The Water Utility office occasionally receives phone calls from customers when there is a dramatic increase in their water/sewer bill from the previous month. This happens because a water-use fixture in the building is malfunctioning. The most probable failing fixture is a toilet. To check if a toilet is leaking, put some food coloring in the water tank, which has clean water in it. If colored water shows up in the bowl, the toilet is leaking water and



needs to be repaired. A toilet leaking only a pint of water a minute will waste over 5,000 gallons of water per month.

The other water fixture that occasionally fails is the water softener. It can fail during the regeneration cycle and waste a large volume of water. Also, the older models regenerate using a timer. The timer could be set to regenerate for too long or too often. The newer models regenerate when on demand, which is more efficient.

Please make sure your plumbing system is operating properly. It costs the water utility to pump, treat and deliver safe water to your home. Also, it costs the sewer utility to collect, pump, and treat the water that is wasted. So if you experience a big increase in your water/sewer bill, check your plumbing system first.

The village has completed a tree inventory of all the street trees and park trees. BlueStem Forestry Consultants performed the inventory and developed a management plan. An informational meeting with the tree board is planned in the near future to discuss the study with the consultant. The public is welcome to attend. Copies of the study are available for review at the village hall.

A preliminary design report to restore the old dam impoundment has been completed by the consultant firm of Inter-Fluve, Inc. A public informational meeting will be held in the near future to discuss the plan. Copies of the plan are available for review at the village hall. The public is welcome to attend.

#### New "Street Numbers" Ordinance

The village recently passed an ordinance concerning the requirement to put street numbers on principle buildings. There was a concern that several homes in the village did not have street numbers attached to them. This is a safety concern for emergency response teams who may not find a house in a timely fashion during emergency situations. Effective January 1, 2002, principle buildings (homes) must have attached numbers not less than 2 1/2" high on a contrasting background that can be easily seen from the street. Please check your home to make sure it is numbered properly. This small effort could prevent a tragedy in the event of an emergency.

Manitowoc County is holding its "Clean Sweep" program to properly dispose of unwanted household paints, chemicals and waste oil. # **Police Department**

### **Part-Time Officer**

#### Don't Be A Victim...

It's not always easy to spot con artists. They're smart, extremely persuasive and aggressive. They invade your home through the telephone, computer, and mail; advertise in well-known newspapers and magazines; and come to your door. They're well mannered, friendly and helpful - at first. Most people think they're too smart to fall for a scam. Con artists rob all kinds of people - from investment counselors and doctors to teenagers and senior citizens - of billions of dollars every year. Cons, scams, and frauds disproportionately victimize senior citizens with false promises of miracle cures, financial security and luxury prizes. One easy rule to remember: If it sounds too good to be true, it probably is.

#### It's the Law

Did you know that three Wisconsin police officers have been struck and killed over the last 12 years while assisting motorists alongside the roadways? Emergency personnel and tow truck drivers are repeatedly placed in danger on our roadsides when motorists drive too close and too quickly. Wisconsin's

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Act 15 requires you to drive a safe zone to emergency vehicles and tow trucks parked on the side of the road. Emergency vehicles are: police cars, ambulances, tow trucks and conservation warden vehicles. If an emergency vehicle with flashing lights is parked within 12 feet of the pavement, motorists should change lanes if possible, move away from the emergency vehicle or slow down until your car is safely past the site if you can safely move over. If you don't change lanes or slow down you may have to pay \$125 to \$458 in fines and court costs. If you fail to change lanes or slow down it may result in property damage. Your driver's license could be suspended for as long as two years.

#### **Annual Report**

There were 619 arrests by the police department in the year 2001. 559 of the arrests were for traffic violations and 60 pertained to other types of arrests. The total number of arrests exceeds last years total by 77.

Investigations by the department numbered 1,072 in 2001 an increase of 530 over 2000.

The department investigated 11 crashes in the village last year resulting in one personal injury and no fatalities. In 2000, there were 18 crashes. Also, during the year there were six domestic violence incidents compared to seven in 2000.

The department collected receipts totaling \$44,749.59. An increase of \$15,750 over 2000. Last year's total included \$31,153.59 in court fines, \$13,582 in parking tickets and \$14 in bicycle registrations.

There were six OWI arrests in 2001, with an average blood alcohol of .19. There were no burglaries and no assaults in 2001, compared to seven burglaries and no assaults in 2000.

#### **Activity Summary**

In the last three months, there was a total of 160 arrests and 57 parking tickets issued. The following are the calls for service: two disorderly conduct, three issue of worthless checks, two 911 calls, one suspicious activity, three suspicious persons, one recovered stolen license plate, two vandalism, two hunting violations, two property damage, four crashes, one paper service, one neighbor trouble, three thefts, three parking complaints, two operating while suspended, one ambulance request, three house watches, five agency assists, one abandoned vehicle, one house fire, two harassing phone calls, one apprehension request, two reckless drivers, one break-in, four dogs at large, one absconding, one barking dog, one suspicious vehicle, one attempt to locate, one hypodermic needle in trash, one operating while intoxicated, two extra patrol requests, one junk on private property, nine records requests, one canceled license plates, one abandoned/unattended refrigerator, two check welfare, three citizen assists, three unlock vehicle requests, one cat at large, one animal carcass, two open doors, two operating after revocation, one traffic enforcement, six background investigations, one peace officer request and one possession of drug paraphernalia.

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# **Centreville Settlement News**

### **Cleveland History**

As Wisconsin became a state in 1848, immigrants from many European countries began arriving in Centreville, a shipping and refueling port on Lake Michigan half way between Fort Green Bay and Milwaukee and half way between villages in Sheboygan and Manitowoc. As post offices were established, there already was a Centreville in Wisconsin so the name was changed to Hika. No one is quite sure where the name Hika originated but the new post office was built on the southwest corner of Beech and Lincoln.

The immigrants that were arriving established two churches in Hika. Both were built on the site of the present St. Johannes Cemetery. St. John's Lutheran Church built in 1861, was on the northeast corner and St. George's Catholic Church, built in 1860, was on the south side.

St. Wendel was originally the mission church built on the site of the St. Wendel Cemetery. The large cross monument in the middle of the cemetery is the site of the original church and the original first stones, although weathered, are in the southeast corner of the cemetery. As more immigrants arrived, by 1875, the mission church became the primary church and a larger frame structure was built. Fire destroyed the church in the 1900's and the present building was built. The history of St. Wendel ends in 2002 when the church was closed as part of the Catholic Church's consolidation plan.

St. Peter Lutheran Church started in the Pleasant Hill School until a church could be built on the site of the Saxon Cemetery . The old Pleasant Hill School, built in 1873 by Carl Reich for \$525, was purchased by Cleveland Hardware and moved to Cleveland after 43 years as a school. It is presently still in use and is the gray building on the north side of West Washington next to Wimmler's and owned by RP Jost.

In 1923, the two Lutheran Churches merged and built the present St. John & St. Peter Lutheran Church in Cleveland.

Information provided by Centreville Settlement, Inc., is dedicated to the preservation of the rural farming heritage in the Cleveland & Centerville area.


# VFW Ladies Auxiliary
