Click on "click-n-ship" (middle of page under "Send Mail and Packages").

Select from there: (enter 15 ounces as weight); shipping label with postage, or shipping label without postage.

After entering return address and address info, select Delivery Confirmation. Then choose "print label."

Bring to the post office for weight check unless you are sure it weighs under one pound. Just mail from your mailbox with flag up for carrier to bring to the post office for processing.


Cost is only \$3.85 anywhere in the country. You can also insure the package for up to \$50. The fee is \$1.30.

The Greater **Centerville Historians**

The Greater Centerville Historians were organized to research the history of the Township of Centerville and Cleveland following the 150th celebration of the Township of Centerville.

It was felt so much history was and is locked away in people's memories and attics. The first gathering of the Greater Centerville Historians occurred in November of 2000 at the former Red Arrow School in Hika.

The people in attendance included Richard Otto Wiegand, Walter and Florence Kress, Diana Kolb, Marie Pippert, Dorothy Anderson, Val Jean Marco, Kathy Pearce and Kathy Sixel.

Gerald O'Neil, the videographer, records the meetings of the Greater Centerville Historians. He records historical information through interviews and discussions with present and former individuals of the local community. He also videotapes photographs to assist in preserving the history.

The Greater Centerville Historians are presently researching the history of the Village of Cleveland. They have already researched the Village of Hika, Point Creek Park, Rutherford's Surf Motor Motel, the railroad and several area cemeteries. The videotapes will be archived at Lakeshore Technical College in Cleveland and will be available for the public to check out later this summer.

The meetings are fun as well as educational. It is so amazing when a discussion is held regarding an event like the dam picnic or the industries, the different memories each person recalls. 






















Hello Gardeners!

If you have just a small space to garden in, this may be a real good thing to check out. You can never get too many ideas for your garden.


Have a great summer out in the yard tending your flowers and veggies, pulling weeds...maybe you can forget that last one.

Public Works Department

The Village has clarified the solid waste agreement with Superior Services on how large appliances and items containing freon will be handled.

Appliances that do not contain freon such as stoves, dishwashers, wash machines, dryers and large console televisions sets can be placed out at the curb on the day of garbage pickup. Superior Services will pick the items up latter that day. Items that contain freon such as refrigerators, freezers, air conditioners, and dehumidifiers can be taken to Superior Services collection site located at 2905 Paine Avenue in Sheboygan and disposed of free of charge with proof of Village residency.

Hours of operation are 7 a.m.-4:30 p.m. Monday through Friday and 7:30-11:30 a.m. on Saturdays. If curbside pickup is requested, Superior Services will pick up the item on the third Wednesday of the month at a charge of \$50. Residents must call Superior Services at 458-6030 in advance to make the proper arrangements. Advance payment is required before an item will be picked up.

Now that the growing season is upon us, free mulch is available to village residents. The mulch is located behind the wastewater plant located on White Tail Lane. The mulch is excellent gardening material.

The Village Public Works Department flushes water mains throughout the village twice a year. Please watch for the flushing notices that are posted throughout the Village and avoid doing your laundry during this period. The water may become rusty colored and could possibly stain your clothes. If you experience discolored water, flush an outside faucet until the water runs clear.

Park Reservation Policy

There have been a few changes made to the Park Reservation Policy for the Village of Cleveland, effective June 1, 2003. The fee will be \$50 per day/\$100 deposit (resident) and \$100 per day/\$150 deposit (non-resident) due at the time of reservation. A dumpster will only be provided at Veteran's Park.

All parks host occasional or ongoing events for which reservations are not required. You are encouraged to check with the Clerk's office to determine whether the park you are

reserving will be used the same evening for regularly scheduled ball games or other events.












Big Plans and Workshops Continue at the historic Lutze Housebarn!



Centreville Settlement, Inc. is a nonprofit organization dedicated to the preservation of rural heritage in the Centreville Area.

The Lutze Housebarn is a unique structure, is heralded across the nation as an outstanding example of Saxon

German architecture from the 1850s. Since 1992, steadfast volunteers have provided talents in woodworking, stone masonry, hole digging, landscaping, cleaning artifacts, old fashioned cooking while enjoyed the old time fellowship of working together outside for a common agrarian project.

The workdays are open to all-young and old. Wear sturdy shoes, work clothes and bring gloves. A farm style dinner served at 12:30 p.m. satisfies the hearty workers. The first workdays of the season include: June 7, 21, July dates include: 12, 26, August work dates are 2, 16, 30, September 13, 27, October 11, 25 with balance in November on 8, 22. Upcoming events include: hands on restoration clinics on timber frame repair, stone masonry, fachwerk (the art of clay and straw mixed together to insulate the outside of the structure. In addition, siding installation, window replacement and interior room artifact arrangements are on the exciting calendar of events for this historical year. Will you make history in your community this year?

Special dates include: Stone Masonry workshop June 19-21, Donor Appreciation Day June 21, Half Timber Repair Internship July 6-12 and Half Timber Repair Workshop July 10-12. In addition, there will be clay Nogging Internship and a workshop slated for August 10-16 and August 14-16 respectively. The 154-year sleep over will be on August 17.

Over the past 10 years at the Lutze Housebarn nearly 15,000 hours of volunteer time have helped it remain one of the premiere historical hands on restoration sites in the country. Tours are available on workdays from 10 a.m.-12 p.m., call in advance to schedule group tours.

Centreville Settlement, Inc. continues to keep Cleveland and the surrounding area in the historical limelight with articles in national level journals, public television documentaries and representation by member on boards of the state historic organizations.
