President's Message

With fall fast approaching, I hope everyone had a wonderful summer enjoying our community. The weather forecast of "cooler near the lake" certainly makes those hot days more bearable here.

Last spring, a community survey was distributed throughout the village. With 23 percent of the surveys returned, Dr. David Kotajarvi, of Lakeshore Technical College, compiled the results and presented them to the village board in June.

Most of the people responding to the survey had some type of contact with our police department. The village police officers have shown concern for victims and are able to handle situations appropriately, providing overall satisfaction while serving our community. Most people felt crime has remained the same in our community, with property theft being a concern. On the question of neighborhood patrolling, 52 percent said it did not matter how often their neighborhoods were patrolled, but 40 percent wanted more frequent patrolling. Finally, 21 percent felt it was essential to have a 24-hour village police department, 44 percent felt it would be good, with only 35 percent says it was not necessary.

I found the positive survey results very interesting and informative. Anyone interested in seeing the entire survey results may stop at village halls to review a copy.

I would like to thank the security department at Lakeshore Technical College for donating a bicycle to the police department for the summer. This provided Chief Barber and Officer Jost an opportunity to be more visible and approachable in the community. Recently I received information from the Department of Revenue on property tax statistics for 2002. I thought you might find it interesting how your community compares to others on local tax (the tax for village purposes). The Village of Cleveland collected \$373,385; Mishicot (pop. 1435) collected \$363,550;



Reedsville (pop. 1195) collected \$379,719; Random Lake (pop. 1563) collected \$646,338; and Elkhart Lake (pop. 1038) collected \$719,887. I hope this shows you that the village board and department managers use your tax dollars very conservatively. As the 2004 budget works begins, I assure you, we will continue to use common sense and be cautious with your tax dollars. Remember, village board members and department manager are taxpayers also.

A letter to the village from Attorney Victor Miller over 30 years ago had some interesting comments in it. It stated, "A community is no better than the activity of each individual." The letter also stated, "Too many people expect miracles from the public servant and they refuse to cooperate." Remember that your actions represent our village. Take time to learn the facts and be proud of all the positives this community has to offer.

Our next stop will be Trinity Lutheran Church which is considered Milwaukee's quintessential 19th Century Geryear, the more the merrier.



The last stop of three churches will be on the south side, St. Josephat's Basilica. This Italian Baroque style church was the first Polish Basilica in North America and the largest, most ornate church in greater Milwaukee's area.

Enjoy this quiet time of beauty, peach and prayer as you marvel at the sights of this truly beautiful time of the year. We will leave for home by 4 p.m.

Cleveland Police Department

During the summer months, the police department was active in several community programs. Chief Barber attended the D.A.R.E. graduation ceremonies at Cleveland Elementary School. Officer Jost gave a bicycle safety talk to the children at the recreation department's morning playground session and a helmet safety program, sponsored by Bonde's Mini-Mart was implemented. Those children riding their bicycles, who were spotted by officers wearing helmets, received a coupon good for a free ice cream cone, candy bar or cookie. And, in conjunction with the Neighborhood Watch

Program, approximately 25 citizens took part in the 20th Anniversary of National Night Out. Chief Barber, Officer Jost and department secretary Rhonda Deehr and their children participated in a potluck dinner and neighborhood walk to commemorate an evening promoting community involvement and crime prevention.

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In July, the department completed set up of the new Amber Alert system. Amber Alert is a cooperative effort between Wisconsin radio and television stations and law enforcement agencies. Amber Alert calls for law enforcement agencies to provide radio and television stations with an alert upon the immediate confirmation of a qualified child abduction. all participating media will break into programming to broadcast the alert provided by law enforcement. Our department received a grant to obtain the state-wide, state-of-the-art digital transmission system, which included a computer, printer, scanner and software.

Both Chief Barber and Officer Jost used a patrol bicycle, on loan from the Lakeshore Technical College's security force, during the Fishing Derby weekend. Bicycle patrol seemed to be well received and the department hopes to use the bikes more next year.





Newsletter items from Public Works.


Residents are reminded not to do extensive landscaping in the street right of way. The area should be left clear in case there is a problem with one of the utilities. If excavation is required, the village will not be responsible to replace trees, shrubs, flowers, or landscaping materials. So it would be best if those things are not placed in the right of way to begin with.

The Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources has reminded this office that private wells in the village need to be either permitted or properly abandoned. There will be a concerted effort in the coming weeks by the water utility to address this issue.

The water quality at the beach at Hika Park has been poor

this summer along with many other beaches in Manitowoc County. There are no answers at this time as to why there is this problem. Steve Simons has joined a team of approximately 15 people from Manitowoc County and the University of Wisconsin to research this issue to determine what is causing the high bacteria levels. Hopefully, the cause can be discovered and corrective actions taken to make the water safe to swim in again.

Thirty-six fire hydrants were sand blasted, primed and painted throughout the village. It is planned to have all the village fire hydrants painted over the next three years. There are approximately 160 fire hydrants in the village.



Cleveland-based WLKN 98.1 Now "Amber Alert" Ready

I wanted to let you about something that will affect both the Village of Cleveland and Manitowoc County in a positive manner.

First, WLKN has joined the Wisconsin Amber Alert program, which is also linked to the nationwide plan. The Amber plan was designed to speed the flow of information about missing children during the critical first hours of an abduction or report of a missing child. Participation in the Amber Alert plan is not mandatory and not all radio stations have joined the plan. WLKN has volun-

tarily chosen to upgrade EAS equipment in order to automatically receive and rebroadcast Amber Alerts issued for our covered counties including Manitowoc. Second, we recently added automatic relay capability of NWS (National Weather Service) alerts. In the event of a tornado warning or other dangerous weather event, WLKN's system will interrupt programming and broadcast the alert immediately. This happens 24/7 regardless of what is on the air at that moment.

Although these upgrades required additional equipment and coordination on our part, I feel that we are now doing an even better job of protecting our audience as well as possibly helping to save a child from danger. These added services are a part of the responsibility we bear as a local radio station and I'm pleased that WLKN is a leader in this regard.

Do You Have A Check Service Pay Your Utility Bill? Office Of The Clerk-treasurer

Several utility customers use a check-free service to pay their monthly billing. For example, the customer provides the amount due to his or her bank, which then cuts and mails the check for payment. The utility stub by necessity is not included with the payment.

Payments made in this way should be mailed directly to the Village Hall at P.O. Box 87. Cleveland State Bank uses the stub for processing, so checks that arrive from a check-free service are held for the clerk's office. Changing the mailing address will result in quicker handling of the utility payment, it will not have to go from the bank to our office and back to the bank again.
