I told people, "Debbie Kiser is our Nancy Reagan, she has to grieve her loss knowing the media is watching her every move." But Mrs. Kiser fooled them; her strength was tremendous as a full military funeral honoring her husband was carried out. Let us not forget Chuck as he touched many lives in our community with his leadership and involvement. Also, please remember Debbie and her children as they plan for the future, one day at a time.

As we plan for the future of our lakefront and the former dam area, this acquisition has become a major piece of the project. Police Department

With great sadness the Cleveland Police Department assisted in the planning of Staff Sergeant Charles "Chuck" Kiser's funeral and law enforcement processional on July 1, 2004. It was with great respect that law enforcement from around the State of Wisconsin paid tribute, for the first time in history, to a non-law enforcement veteran killed in the line of duty. One week later, Officer Jost traveled to Rhinelander to pay tribute to Kiser's fellow Army Reservist, Stephen Martin, also a Sergeant with the Rhinelander Police Department.

On March 23, 2004, Officer Ron Jost began teaching DARE in Mr. Sohn's fifth grade classroom. Believe it or not, in 1978 Officer Jost was a student in Mr. Sohn's sixth grade class at Cleveland Elementary, returning the favor of education to Mr. Sohn's current students.

On June 4, eleven students received graduation certificates for successful completion of the program. Mr. Larry Hisle, former Milwaukee Brewer All-Star was the featured speaker, and gave an emotional address to the entire student body about the dangers of drugs, alcohol and tobacco.

On May 3, the Police Department took a complaint of obscene phone calls from Lakeshore Technical College and worked closely with LTC and the Hancock County, Indiana, Sheriff's Department

to track down a suspect through telephone and computer Internet records. The Cleveland Police Department was able to track his Internet usage through assistance from LTC and two subpoenas issued by the Manitowoc County District Attorney's Office.

The suspect, from Indianapolis, Indiana, had made over 500 obscene calls throughout the nation over the past four years, and was finally apprehended and successfully prosecuted in Indiana.

On July 14, Chief Barber assisted the Department of Natural Resources and the Manitowoc County Sheriff's Department in the apprehension of a felony suspect from Chicago, Illinois. The Sheboygan County Sheriff's Department issued an attempt-to-locate on a vehicle involved in a gasoline drive-off from a mini-mart in their county. A DNR agent located the vehicle northbound on Interstate 43 and when the suspect vehicle rammed his truck near the City of Manitowoc, Chief Barber then led the ensuing chase, as the suspect fled northbound on the interstate. The suspect vehicle's tires were spiked by a Mishicot officer near STH 147, forcing the vehicle to stop two miles south of the Brown County line. A brief foot chase followed with the suspect being apprehended in a wooded area east of the interstate. The suspect vehicle was reported as stolen by the Chicago Police Department and the suspect was charged with several felonies by the District Attorney's Office.

Chief Barber continued to attend monthly meetings involving the traffic plan for the PGA event at Whistling Straights.

Officer Jost gave a presentation on that traffic plan to the Cleveland Fire Department and First Responders.

Administrative Assistant Deehr attended the LEAP (Law Enforcement Administrative Professionals) training conference.

Activity Report

Daily activity for the months of May, June and July 2004:

The Police Department responded to 92 requests for service, twenty-two agency assists, eight records requests, five department information reports, four house watches, three parking complaints, three auto lockouts, one family trouble, two disorderly conduct, four animal complaints, one warrant hit, three assist citizen, two EMS/assist ambulance, one family trouble, one neighbor trouble, one damage to property, one probation violation, two illegal passing of school bus, one traffic control request, one breach of trust, two 911 calls, two act as peace officer, two abandoned vehicle, three traffic accidents, two law enforcement funerals, two thefts, one obscene phone call complaint, one found property, two vandalism and two issuance of worthless check complaints.

One criminal referral was sent to the District Attorney's office.

Our day will be spent in America's Little Switzerland (New Glarus), located in the rolling hills of Green County, 25 miles south of Madison.

On arrival by 10 a.m., we will enjoy a pleasant journey back in time to the Swiss Historical Village. First opened in 1942, the village tells the story of the founding and growth of the Swiss Colony and the birth of the foreign-type cheese industry. The museum has been expanded to include 14 buildings with exhibits focusing on rural and small-town life with an ethnic flavor. Our tour guide will give us a personal look at all of this history.

Our 12:30 p.m. meal will be at the New Glarus Hotel where we will experience authentic Swiss atmosphere, food, and entertainment.

Since today opens the annual "Octoberfest," we should have the chance to spend some time at the park and the beginnings of these festivities. Otherwise, we'll have time to explore some of the charming shops, such as Maple Leaf Cheese & Chocolate Shoppe, Fifth Ave. Shops, Robert's Imports and Ruef's Meat Market; and, hopefully, the New Glarus Bakery will be open again by this time; all within a block or two of the hotel. We will plan to leave for home no later than 4 p.m.

Cost: \$59 per person includes transportation by Sunset Tours, Inc., admission to Swiss Historical Village, and lunch with entertainment.

Saturday – 8 a.m. to Noon.


Fees:

Cleveland Public Works

- The Public Service Commission has determined that the water utility is eligible for a cost of living increase of three percent for the water utility. The water utility requires the increase in order to meet the covenant requirements of its revenue bond. The increase will add an additional 82 cents to the water bill for a customer that uses 5,000 gallons of water.

- Water customers are reminded that the summer sewer rates will expire at the end of August. Rates for sewage service will revert back to actual consumption as measured by the water meter.

- Another thirty-six fire hydrants were sand blasted, primed and painted throughout the Village this year. It is planned to have the rest of the fire hydrants painted over the next two years. There are approximately 160 fire hydrants in the Village.

- Preliminary engineering work has begun on the reconstruction of Elm Street, East Madison Avenue and East Grant Avenue. Work is tentatively scheduled to be completed in 2005. Storm sewer, curb and gutter and new pavement are to be installed. All affected property owners will be contacted and an informational meeting will be held once the engineering and preliminary assessments are completed.

- Compost material is available at the yard waste site behind the wastewater treatment plant. Village residents are encouraged to help themselves to this excellent gardening material.
