Comprehensive Planning Begins

This is to inform you that the Village of Cleveland and Town of Centerville have begun the process to develop our respective Comprehensive Plans for the purpose of guiding and coordinating future development in each community. Grants from the Wisconsin Coastal Management Program and the Wisconsin Department of Administration have provided each community with the funding necessary to complete our plans. Our plans are designed to be long-range (10-20 years) and encompass a broad view of each community's past, present, and future growth patterns in respect to such areas as transportation, housing, demographics, economic development, and natural resources.

The Bay-Lake Regional Planning Commission has been hired to facilitate the process for the completion of both the Village of Cleveland and Town of Centerville Comprehensive Plans. Cleveland and Centerville have selected a joint 18 member Smart Growth Commission to provide information, communicate with fellow resident as to the progress being made on the plans, solicit public input, finalize, and approve the plans. The planning process began in June and is anticipated to be completed in October 2006.

Your Input is Needed

Comprehensive plans should reflect the people they serve; as a result, we are encouraging citizen input at all stages of the planning process. Identifying a vision for the future is the first step of the process. Therefore, each community is asking residents/land owners to fill out the <u>enclosed</u> **Visioning Survey** in an effort to gather input regarding your community's future development/preservation. Your responses provided on this survey will be used as a guide during the development of the comprehensive plans and the growth of your community over the next 20 years. All members of the household are encouraged to respond on the same worksheet.

In addition, the Smart Growth Commission would like to form sub-committees to help generate ideas and strategies for each of the plan's elements. One or two members of Smart Growth Commission will serve as chairpersons for these sub-committees. If you are interested in serving on one or more of the sub-committees, please complete the <u>enclosed form</u>. Your **Visioning Survey** and **Sub-Committee Form** are to be returned to your respective Village or Town Clerk **by Sept. 30**, **2005**.

Thank you in advance for your input and participation into this planning process. We feel it will be a very informative and productive process to more efficiently guide our communities for decades to come. LTC Board Elects Officers

The Lakeshore Technical College Board recently elected officers for the 2005-06 academic year.

James Lehrke was elected board chairperson. He has served on the board for a decade and is the president of Safety Connections, Inc.

Cindy Huhn will serve as vice chair. She Joined the board in 2002 and is the Village of Cleveland president. Cindy is also the vice president and cashier at Cleveland State Bank.

Jerry Voechting was elected secretary/treasurer. He has served on the board for 24 years and is a retired business representative for Sheet Metal Workers Local 18. Two individuals were reappointed to the board in addition to Cindy Huhn: Nancy Crowley and Jutta Furca. Along with the board officers, they join fellow board

members Ruth Harker, Roy Kluss, John Lukas, and Dr. C. Lee Riter.

The LTC District is headed by a nine-member board of directors who serve staggered three-year terms and are responsible for the direct operation of the college. They are empowered to levy property taxes, provide for facilities and equipment, employ staff, and contract for services. The board sets academic and grading standards, appoints the college president, hires instructional and other staff, and manages budgets. The board includes two employers, two employees, a school district administrator, a state or local elected official, and three additional members as defined by statute. A district appointment committee composed of county board chairpersons appoints board members subject to the approval of the Wisconsin Technical College System Board.

Local Residents Now Have to Register to Vote

New state voter registration rules require all municipalities-towns, villages and cities-to keep track of voter information in Wisconsin's new Statewide Voter Registration System (SVRS). All Cleveland residents must register and be entered into the system before they can participate in another election.

The new rules will help every clerk in Wisconsin to keep track of voters who have moved or passed away, or who haven't satisfied a felony conviction. It will also be easier to check for those persons who may try to vote more than once in an election.

To register, Village of Cleveland residents must go to the Clerk-Treasurer's office at the Village Hall, 1150 W. Washington Avenue, Cleveland, and present a Wisconsin driver's license or state identification card. Office hours are 8:30 AM to 4:30 PM, Monday through Friday. Voters who do not have a driver's license or ID card may provide a social security card instead.

Although Election Day registration will be allowed, unregistered voters will face extra delays at the poll as they complete paperwork and get entered into the system.
